Current Board members up for re-election:

William Flank


them integral parts of the boat, through environmental education and rigorous leadership training. The young women are split up into four "watches" to learn various specialties about the river and



Micro-plastics

The Hudson River Sloop Clearwater has teamed up with scientists to look for the presence of micro-plastics within the Hudson River. Microplastics are commonly found as "microbeads." Microbeads are the tiny plastic beads that in the 1990s began replacing natural ingredients in cleansers (i.e almonds, oatmeal, sea salt). Microbeads are commonly washed down shower drains and bathroom sinks, passing through wastewater treatment plants and discharged within New York waters. Clearwater is using a special net called a "manta trawl" to sample the river for signs of these plastic particles. The microbeads can be mistaken for food by aquatic animals, passing into their digestive tract and eventually making their way into their circulatory system. Microbeads are buoyant and are also hydrophobic. This means they can combine with chemicals like PCBs, thus allowing the PCBs (which are normally found in mostly in river sediments) to distribute throughout the entire water column. To do your part, do not use products which include the ingredient Polyethylene/ Polypropylene. Environmental Action/Green Cities: Clearwater welcomes new Green Cities Coordinator



On July 7 Omari Washington joined Clearwater's Environment Action/Green Cities program to head up the excellent work we are doing in several river cities to empower community members, especially urban youth, to transform their neighborhoods by using various forms of green infrastructure. Omari will work with community-based organizations and agencies such as Nubian Directions in Poughkeepsie,

the Newburgh Armory Unity Center and the Peekskill Youth Bureau, and with skilled instructors and expert contractors, to provide career-



oriented training in reen stormwater management and green building retrofits. Trainees will acquire knowledge and marketable skills rough handsn work, such as



building rain gardens and bioswales to beautify neighborhoods and divert stormwater from cities' overburdened sewer systems, among other projects. Omari will also help develop replicable sustainability curriculum for middle school, high school and beyond. With his background as an environmental educator with CityScience and the NY Restoration Project in New York City, Omari is the ideal person to grow this initiative, which was very much part of Pete Seeger's vision for Clearwater's future.





Hudson River PCBs: Cleaning up the river is an ongoing task

General Electric is making excellent progress with the cleanup of PCB-contaminated sediments in a 40-mile stretch of the upper

Hudson, north of Albany. This is the fifth year of active dredging and GE estimates the remediation will be complete by mid-summer 2015. However, Clearwater, Riverkeeper, Scenic Hudson, NRDC and a coalition of upriver communities are calling for the remediation to be extended to address an additional 136 acres just outside the area delineated for dredging to remove more PCBs and to provide for navigational dredging to deepen the channel to ensure full

use of the River by commercial shipping vessels. If done while GE contractors are mobilized and the dewatering facilities and rail spur are still operational, the added work would be far less expensive for NYS Canal Corporation – which is funded by our bridge and road tolls. We are hoping GE will enter into a voluntary agreement to



and harmful zoning to expand the Port of Coeymans, which would compromise the Coeymans/Hannacroix Creek Complex – a Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Area.

Indian Point: Clearwater supports seasonal outages at Indian Point to protect Hudson River fish:

The 2.5 billion gallons a day of cooling water consumed by Indian Point has disastrous consequences for struggling Hudson River fish populations. Adult fish get sucked against the intake screens and are killed by impingement; smaller fish, eggs and larvae pass through the screens and are cooked during entrainment in the once through


cooling system, which – with thermal pollution of heated discharge water – cause total fish mortality in the billions per year. Recently

the NYS DEC Staff issued a Fact Sheet on Scheduled BTA Outages/Seasona Protective Outag



and held a hearing for public comment. Clearwater believes that the Best Technology Available to minimize fish kill in the Hudson River is still closed cycle cooling, but that full seasonal outages should be implemented as soon as possible to protect our declining fisheries.

ELECTION 2014: YOUR VOTE IS IMPORTANT!

Clearwater members near and far vote to elect Board candidates into office every year – and it's that time again. Board members serve 3-year terms, and may serve three consecutive terms before they must rotate off for at least one year. Here's how the process works:

I. A nominating committee, comprised of Board members and non-Board members, identifies and recruits a slate of candidates.

2. The full Board of Directors accepts or amends the slate.

3. Additional candidates are added by petition with five Board members' or 30 Clearwater members' signatures.

4. A ballot is mailed to the membership before 4 weeks of the Annual Meeting (September 27).

5. All current members are STRONGLY ENCOURAGED to vote. There have been times in the past when Board members were elected almost solely by those who were able to attend the Annual Meeting – a small minority of Clearwater's thousands of members! [N.B. Ballots are anonymous, but must include the member code to the right above your name on the original copy of the address label in order to be counted.]

6. Votes are counted and the new Board members announced.

7. The new Board convenes, electing its officers and Executive Committee, and reconstituting its committees.

Board members play key, creative roles in setting policy, oversight, fundraising, event planning, program development, financial management, public relations, and project management, and must serve as articulate, credible spokespersons and ambassadors for Clearwater. It is vitally important that you vote, by mail or by attending the Annual Meeting.
