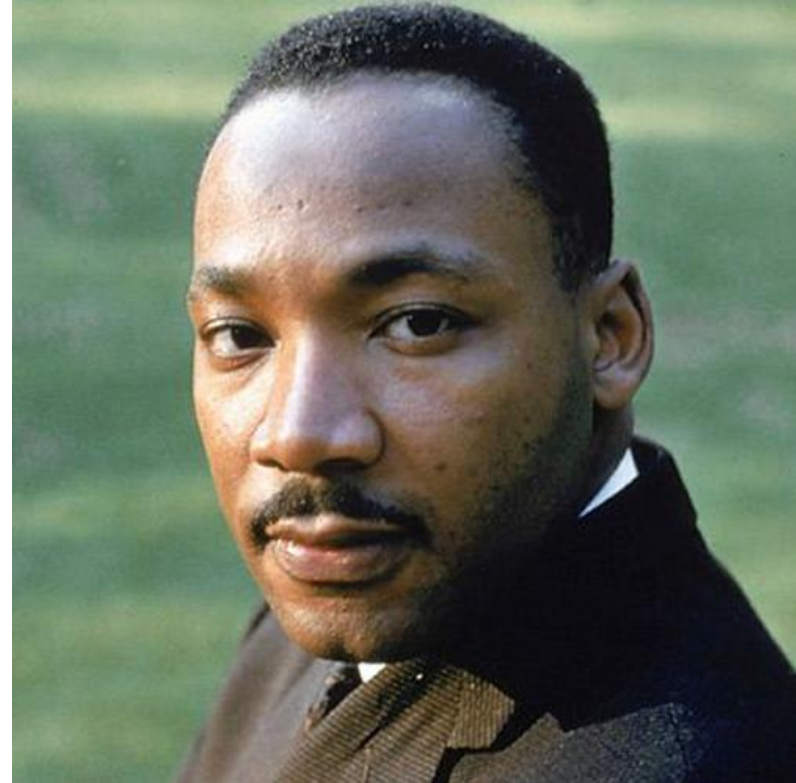




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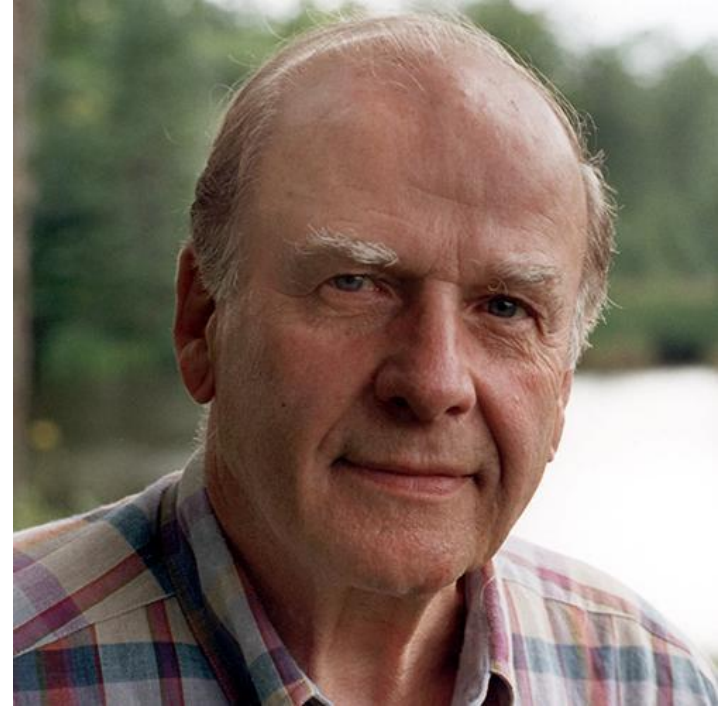

Raiders Tell of Killing 19 and Capturing 41—Cairo Lists Fo's Casualties at 30

JERUSALEM, Friday, Jan. 23—An Israeli task force led by helicopter-borne commandos yesterday captured the Egyptian island of Shadwan, at the entrance to the Gulf of Suez, and prepared to remove its radar station, the Israelis reported.

A senior military officer said last night: "We'll probably bring it back once we get the screws loose."

The Israelis said that Shadwan, a banana-shaped island consisting mostly of rocks and coral, had been captured after six hours of fighting. They reported that 19 Egyptians and 3 Israelis had been killed. In addition, they said that two Egyptian torpedo boats had been sunk by Israeli jets 10 miles south of Shadwan. Each boat is believed to have carried 20 men.

In Cairo, a military spokesman said that at least 30 Israeli soldiers had been killed or wounded and that two Israeli planes had been shot down.

Attack During Night
Egyptian air and naval units sought during the night to strike back but not to attempt to retake the island, an Israeli announcement said. Two Egyptian naval craft were reported to have approached the island in the darkness but to have been driven off with gunfire.

Egyptian jets were reported to have dropped explosives but the Israelis said they had caused no damage or casualties.

President Terms Prospect For Peace Much Improved

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—The prospects for peace in Vietnam were described today by President Nixon as far greater than they were a year ago. He forecast a good prospect of "a generation of uninterrupted peace" for America.

Mr. Nixon, in his State of the Union Message, drew applause from the joint session of Congress when he said:

"The major immediate goal of our foreign policy is to bring an end to the war in Vietnam in a way that our generation will be remembered not so much as the generation that suffered in the war but more for the fact that we had the courage and character to win the kind of a just peace that the next generation was able to keep."

DISTRICTING PLAN FOR STATE PASSED BY 1-VOTE MARGIN

G.O.P. Rushes Ailing Senator to Capitol to Gain Approval of Congressional Lines

ALBANY, Jan. 22—The State Senate and Assembly approved a Republican Congressional redistricting plan today after seven hours of interparty wrangling that ended when a conservative Senator was rushed to the Capitol to cast the deciding vote.

The final vote, by Senator Anthony B. Giorio, Republican of Fort Chester, who had been recuperating at home after hospitalization, was needed to pass the controversial G.O.P. plan when angry Democratic legislators forced their own leaders to stand firm against the Republicans.

The legislation redrawing the state's 41 districts, an action that is expected to help elect two or more new Republican Representatives this year, must be submitted to Governor Rockefeller for his approval and submitted to Federal courts for approval before Jan. 30.

Unexpected Excitement

The passage of the plan today—the votes were 75-69 in the Assembly and 29-19 in the Senate—was expected. But there was unexpected excitement all day in the Capitol because of these developments:

•Democratic Assemblymen decided in caucus to stand united against the bill after some of them argued hotly against Minority Leader Stanley Steingut's decision to allow a dozen or so to vote with the Republicans.

•Cause of first Democratic opposition, united in the Assembly and then in the Senate, the Republican leadership had to import absentee legislators from all over the state to gain majorities in both houses. Mr. Giorio arrived shortly after a state plane flew two Suffolk County Senators to give the Republicans 29 votes, the necessary majority in the 57-member Senate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—President Nixon committed himself and challenged the country today to rescue the American environment from years of human indifference and to display, in the decade ahead, a deeper concern for the quality of American life.

In his first State of the Union Message, the 37th President placed "first priority" on world peace and a "just" settlement of the war in Vietnam. But his major preoccupation was the state of the union, not the state of the world, and his central message was an appeal to match the resources of the 1970's to the vision of the 1770's.

Prospects for 1970's

Before a joint session of Congress assembled in the chamber of the House of Representatives, Mr. Nixon sketched in 36 minutes a portrait of a nation rich in resources but confused in purpose and concerned about forces seemingly beyond its control. His picture was of a nation robbed of its natural heritage by human and industrial carelessness, cheated of the dividends of economic growth by inflation, poorly served by a proliferating Federal apparatus, and threatened by crime and the growth in population.

The address drew a generally favorable response in Congress. Republicans approved it and Democrats, despite some skepticism on key points, regarded it as a skillful exercise in which the President seized upon issues

The right to clean water demands the ***right to know*** if water is clean.

1972 Clean Water Act, Section 101:

It is the national goal that the discharge of pollutants into the navigable waters be eliminated **by 1985**;

It is the national goal that wherever attainable, an interim goal of water quality which provides for the protection and propagation of fish, shellfish, and wildlife and provides for recreation in and on the water be achieved **by July 1, 1983**;

It is the national policy that the discharge of **toxic pollutants** in toxic amounts **be prohibited**;

It is the national policy that programs for the **control of nonpoint sources** of pollution be developed . . . as to enable the goals of this chapter to be met.

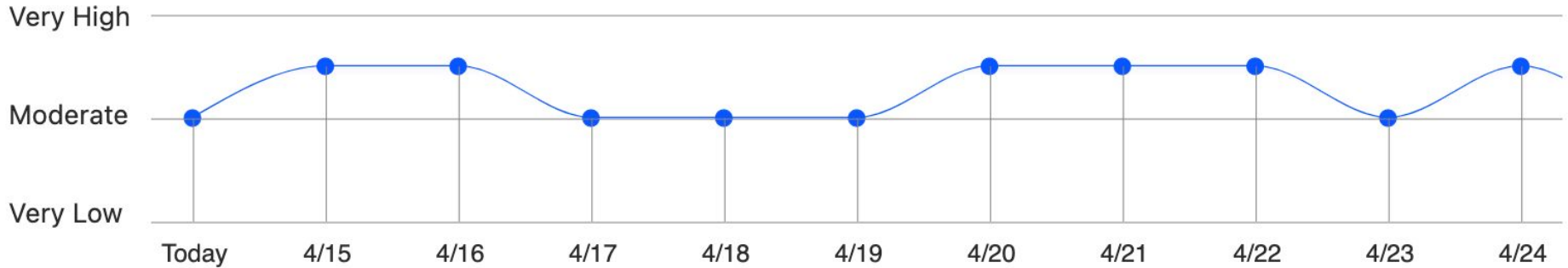
